## City Fire Levy

Voters will be asked to consider a 2.5-mill fire levy at the polls on November 8, 2016. The existing levy was approved in 2001 when voters agreed to combine separate fire and emergency medical service levies. That levy enabled the Fire Department to operate its own paramedic service.

Revenues derived from the current levy are based upon property valuations of tax year 2000. This means that the City does not realize any increases in revenue as a result of property value appreciation.

Additionally, the Ohio General Assembly eliminated the Tangible Personal Property Tax in 2011 which reduced funds originally budgeted for Fire/EMS services by \$400,000 annually. As a result, the fire department has been heavily subsidized by the City's General Fund for the past several years. The subsidy this year is expected to approach \$1.2 million. The effect of the subsidy is a reduction in the City's ability to invest in and make improvements to road infrastructure. In addition, the City's bond rating could be lowered as a result of the need to subsidize the fire fund.



To reduce costs, some full-time positions have not been filled when vacancies occurred. The Fire Department's staffing levels are lower than they were when the levy was originally passed despite call volume increases of more than 42%. Increases in the cost of employee health insurance benefits and EMS supplies, along with general inflation, have made it necessary to seek the proposed levy.

Additional revenues realized by the proposed levy would offset the increases and provide stability to both the Fire and General Operating Funds. Using the Butler County Auditor's figures, it is estimated the levy would cost the owner of a \$100,000 home \$87.50 per year. The new levy would be in addition to the current 4.65-mill levy.

## Charter Change Information

The following information is being published to inform all electors of a proposed Fairfield Charter change that will be on the ballot November 8, 2016.

At issue is a proposal to transfer all Fairfield Board of Building Appeals duties to the Fairfield Board of Zoning Appeals. The Board of Building Appeals' role is to review appeals to the Residential Building Code of Ohio.

There has been only one requested appeal in the past 10 years. Therefore keeping a functioning board has been difficult. The Board of Building Standards, who is the State Oversight Board, has given their acceptance to the proposed modification. The Board of Zoning Appeals is an active Board that meets the first Wednesday of every month and with a charter change will be able to hear any appeals to the Ohio Residential Code. All commercial building appeals must still be heard at the Board of Building Standards in Columbus, OH. This will not be impacted by any local charter change.

# Miami Chapel Cemetery Restoration

Tucked along River Road sits the Miami Chapel Cemetery, an intriguing place for historians and residents interested in the early days of Fairfield. The quarter-acre cemetery is home to more than 100 marked and unmarked graves, including one of a Revolutionary War soldier, a War of 1812 soldier and four veterans from the Civil War.



Miami Chapel Cemetery was originally known as Black Bottom Cemetery then Fair Play and finally carried the name of Miami Chapel, which was the name of the Methodist Church that sat at the property from around 1843 until it was razed in the late 1920's. The oldest known burial on the site was in 1810 and the last burial was in the late 1940's.

This project is scheduled to bid in late summer 2016 for a fall/winter construction. The City of Fairfield's Utility Department is relocating a 20" water main in advance of the bridge work. The work will require a road closure and traffic detour which will be posted prior to bridge construction.

## New Senior Apartments Under Construction

Construction recently started on a new apartment facility for seniors aged 55 years and older. Fairfield Village Senior Apartments will be located on Patterson Drive in the northern section of the Town Center area. The building will be three stories and will contain 119 units. The apartments are designed for independent living, not assisted living.

Clover Group Inc. is developing the facility and will own and manage it upon completion, which is expected in Fall 2017. Clover specializes in senior living facilities and has a lot of experience with similar projects across the country.

The building will include a mix of 1- and 2-bedroom units. Other amenities include a community room, a beauty salon, and an exercise room. Residents will also have access to garage parking, extra storage

## Pacific Starts \$50M Expansion

Pacific Manufacturing Ohio Inc., already one of Fairfield's largest employers, recently started construction on a major expansion that will add a 72,000 square foot expansion to the rear of its facility at 8935 Seward Road. This addition will include 50-foot tall ceilings to accommodate three new large stamping machines.

Pacific is an automotive parts manufacturer, making a variety of metal and plastic component parts. It is a Tier 1 auto parts supplier to Toyota, along with also supplying parts for Honda, Mitsubishi and Subaru. Pacific has operated in Fairfield for more than 25 years and has grown considerably over the years. It has three large manufacturing facilities along Seward Road.



Senior Pacific leadership from Japan recently visited with Mayor Steve Miller and other City officials to discuss its large expansion project.

Total new investment for the project is estimated at \$50 million, which includes \$5 million in new building construction and \$45 million in new machinery and equipment. Pacific will create at least 60 new jobs as a result of this project, which will take its total employment in Fairfield to more than 600. 🌐

# New Home For Construction Company

A local construction company is celebrating its 20th anniversary by building a new home for itself in Fairfield.

Loveland Excavating & Paving, Inc., which employs more than 60 workers, specializes in site development, underground utility work, and asphalt paving for commercial and residential projects. It is well-known and well-respected in the greater Cincinnati construction industry.



Owner Matt Brennan founded the company in 1996. After surviving the recession of a few years ago, Loveland outgrew its leased space on LeSaint Drive. The company chose to stay in Fairfield by buying a vacant lot on Osborne Drive and constructing a new office and equipment storage facility. Loveland will spend more than \$1 million on the project, which will be finished this Fall.

"This facility will keep us in the community that has supported us over the years and will better fit our growing needs," said owner Matt Brennan. "With more office space, a larger shop, and a greater parking and equipment area, we will be able to operate more efficiently, expand our staff, and continue to provide outstanding service to our customers." 🌐

# New Transit Option For Workers and Businesses

Earlier this year, the Butler County Regional Transit Authority (BCRTA) started a new route: R6—Job Connector. The hope is that this route will be an economic development tool for local businesses and an affordable resource for workers.



The R6—Job Connector runs between downtown Hamilton, through the industrial business areas along Symmes Road, Bypass 4, and Port Union Road in Fairfield, into southern West Chester and Tri-County Mall in Springdale. The cost is \$2 per ride, with connections to other BCRTA routes and Cincinnati Metro routes available. "Given the historic transit data we have and

the support from the business community, we expect this project will connect more workers with vacant jobs in Butler County," said Matthew Dutkevicz, Executive Director of BCRTA.



Funding for the new service comes from a variety of sources, including federal grants and local support from the City of Fairfield, Butler County, the City of Hamilton and the Hamilton Community Foundation.

# Training For Jobs In The Supply Chain Industry

The movement and shipping of goods and materials (collectively referred to as the logistics industry) is a major part of the greater Cincinnati economy. Roughly 60% of the U.S. population can be reached within a one-day drive and nearly 80% is within a two-day drive. Interstate 75 is the nation's busiest truck route.

Many regional companies struggle to find qualified workers in this rapidly growing industry. To help meet this business demand for workers, particularly those trained in materials handling and supply chain logistics, Cincinnati State opened the Supply Chain Career Development Center in June 2016.

The Center, which is located in a warehouse facility in West Chester, was created via a grant

from the U.S. Department of Labor. The goal is to deliver career training programs that can be completed in two years or less for employment in high-demand fields.

Programs offered through the Supply Chain Career Development Center include:

- Forklift Essentials Certificate
- Global Logistics Associate Certificate
- Commercial Driver's License (CDL)
- MSSC Certified Logistics Technician Certification




### THE RAINMAKER

## Public Utilities Projects Around Town

Fairfield's Public Utilities Department is gearing up for several large infrastructure improvement projects to be completed this summer or fall. Projects include:

- John Gray Road bridge water main relocation: this project will relocate and replace approximately 220 feet of 20" ductile iron pipe. Existing pipe will be removed from the bridge structure, and the new pipe will be installed under Pleasant Run Creek, providing better protection from the elements and potential vehicular accidents. New valves will also be added on the water main, improving system flexibility and redundancy. This project is being performed in advance of a pending bridge deck improvement project, scheduled for late fall 2016. Water main relocation project cost is roughly \$154,000.
- Mack Road water tower improvements: this project will clean, repair, and paint – both inside and out – the Mack Road water storage tower located south-east of the Mercy Hospital campus. This 500,000 gallon water tower is a critical component of the City's water distribution system and at 30+ years of age, is due for a major renovation. This project will be performed in September and October. Water tower repair and painting project cost is roughly \$350,000.
- Joe Nuxhall Way sanitary sewer extension project: this project will install roughly 900 feet of sanitary sewer line east of Wake Nation. The sewer will serve a new shelter house and restroom structure to be constructed at Grange Park and soccer fields. Fairfield's Parks, Public Utilities, and Public Works Departments collaborated on this project. Project cost is roughly \$32,000.



## William Harbin Park Improvement Project

The Fairfield Parks and Recreation Department is in the process of developing a master plan for the improvement of William Harbin Park and is interested in acquiring public input on the draft conceptual design of the improvement project.

William Harbin Park opened in the 1970's. The park, located at 1300 Hunter Road, is approximately 200 acres and offers a variety of recreational opportunities; scenic overlook, picnic shelters, playgrounds, lighted sledding hill, paved bike/hike paths, mountain bike trails, nature trails, tennis/pickle ball courts, basketball courts, disc golf course and large natural expanses.

The City has retained Brandstetter Carroll, Inc., for the conceptual design of the improvement project. A public input meeting will be held at the Fairfield Community Arts Center on Thursday, September 15th, from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm. The draft conceptual design was developed from information collected at the first public input session, stakeholder/focus group meetings and the MySideWalk website.

# Credit Card Skimmers

**C**redit card fraud is an ever changing crime these days. The criminals and the devices they use to steal your information are becoming more sophisticated. We can't completely stop these crimes, but through a little effort we can greatly reduce the chance that your information and money will be stolen.

The newest device being used to steal your information is the credit card skimmer. A skimmer is a device that grabs the data off your credit card's magnetic strip. The criminal can then put your information onto a cloned card and use it to purchase items. The skimmers can be attached externally to ATMs or internally on gas pump card readers.

The skimmers placed on ATMs are placed over the actual card reader on the machine. The ATM will work normally. The device will capture your information from the magnetic strip on the card, but the criminal also needs your personal identification number or PIN. They will capture this through a pinhole camera they placed somewhere on the ATM or a pad that goes over the existing keypad that will record what buttons are pushed.

The skimmers used on gas pump machines are typically attached internally to the external credit card reader on the pump. There is no way for the customer to know that there is a skimmer attached to the card reader. The picture on the bottom right portion of this page is a skimmer taken off a gas pump in the City of Fairfield\*.

How can we minimize our exposure to these devices? If using an ATM, check for tampering with the machine. Pull on the card reader, pull on the keypad, and pull on any piece that doesn't look familiar. If the items move or come off, **DO NOT** use the machine and report it to the bank. Do the colors of the card reader and keypad match with the rest of the colors on the machine? Are the stickers near these items on straight? If the answer is no, **DO NOT** use the machine. Use one of your hands to restrict the view of the keypad as you type in your PIN. Try to use ATMs that are inside stores because they are less likely to be tampered with.

If using a gas pump, try to use a pump with an unobstructed view of the cashier. The criminals have to attach the skimmer and will likely pick a pump the cashier cannot easily see. If you cannot pick a pump in front of the cashier go inside to pay for your gas.

These simple steps can help you avoid being scammed, but they are not fool proof. If you find that your information has been stolen, contact your bank or credit card company and file a claim with them. Contact the police department as well so that we can look into the matter.




# Grass & Weeds Lead Zoning Complaints

In order to ensure that private properties are maintained in the City, Fairfield has legislation in place that specifies a series of maintenance standards. Like most communities, these standards ensure not only the safety of buildings, but also help maintain property values and the desirability of neighborhoods.

Zoning inspectors regularly tour areas to observe and enforce the codes. Inspectors also respond to calls received on the Zoning Hotline at (513) 867-5321 or via email at [propertymaintenance@fairfield-city.org](mailto:propertymaintenance@fairfield-city.org).

The chart illustrates violations most often cited by inspectors. The majority of complaints relate to high grass and weeds, followed by complaints of trash and vehicles being parked on grassy areas.

Residents who are aware of a property that is not being maintained, especially issues relating to high grass, are encouraged to get in contact with the City by one of the methods described above. A specific legal process is required before the City can step in to cut grass at homes not being maintained. The process can take several weeks, so the sooner the City is aware of a need, the faster action can be taken to remedy the eyesore.



## Road Improvements

### Holden Blvd./South Gilmore Rd./Route 4 Intersection Improvement

After receiving funding from the Ohio Department of Transportation's Central Office Safety Program, the intersection of Route 4/Holden/South Gilmore is currently under construction. A number of changes are being made to improve the safety of the intersection. First and foremost, the alignment of South Gilmore Road and Holden Boulevard will be improved to reduce the deflection that currently exists in the intersection. A second through lane will be added to Holden crossing the intersection to South Gilmore. The left turn lane from South Gilmore to northbound Route 4 will be lengthened to accommodate more vehicles and a left turn lane will be added for vehicles accessing Parkland Hills. Other improvements include illuminated signage, new curb and stormwater infrastructure, and continuous sidewalks along Holden and South Gilmore.



Vehicles using this intersection already experience significant delays and these delays are expected to increase temporarily during construction. All traffic will be maintained, but lane shifts and closures will slow travel in the area. If possible, motorists and pedestrians are encouraged to find alternate routes during construction, which is expected to last until later this fall. The City will utilize portable electronic message boards and press releases to notify the public of significant events during construction.

The City is using this project as an opportunity to apply for Greenroads certification. The Greenroads rating system is a way to measure and manage the sustainability of transportation projects by encouraging excellence in environmental, social, and economic practices with an independent third-party review. # Winterizing Your Swimming Pool

Falling leaves and cold weather can mean potential damage to your pool and pool equipment. Taking these weatherization steps now could save you costly repairs next summer.

1. Conduct a final pool water test to verify water is balanced.
2. Clean and vacuum pool thoroughly.
3. Clean skimmer and lint trap.
4. Clean filter per manufacturer's recommendation.
5. Chlorinate and algicide pool water per manufacturer's recommendation.
6. Add pool winterizing anti-freeze to pipes and equipment.
7. Cover your pool to protect from leaves, dirt and debris.

The pool cover should be tight so that no more than 4" of water can collect on the top. For above ground pools, the ladder should be removed or locked. For in-ground pools, the gates to the yard should latch closed preventing access by children. Storable pools must be removed from the yard in the off-season. Fairfield Codified Ordinance, Section 1343.03(i)(7) states:

"Storable pools are those that are constructed above ground with a maximum depth of 42 inches, or a pool with nonmetallic wall or inflatable fabric wall of any size. All storable pools are required to be removed from service and stored away between the period of **November 1st and April 1st.**"

## Fire Pit Safety

While fire pits can be a fun way for spending time with friends and family on chilly evenings in our yards, there are a few things to keep in mind that will help to keep it safe. When it comes time to actually start a fire, there are a few things to keep in mind, the most important of which is to keep your fire small. There's no need for a blazing bonfire; the bigger the fire, the greater the potential for disaster.

First things first, your fire pit should be at least 10-feet away from any structure or combustible surface. Check the weather forecast before lighting an outdoor fire; avoid windy conditions that can blow embers. Also, stay up to date on any burn bans or burn ordinances that may be in effect at different times during the year. Always have a container of water nearby

and a garden hose on standby before starting the fire.

Be sure to do a little yard cleaning beforehand. Pick up leaves and other combustible materials around the pit to ensure that the fire doesn't accidentally spread. The Ohio Fire Code gives the Fire Department the authority to have any fire extinguished that is determined to create a hazard, is too large or a nuisance (like too much smoke).



## Rules Regarding Open Burning

The City of Fairfield, in compliance with the Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency, prohibits any form of open burning that involves garbage, waste materials containing rubber, grease, asphalt or any other material containing petroleum products. Open burning cannot be used to dispose of yard waste, tree trimmings or other vegetation.

Campfires and fire pits are permitted with wood stacks no larger than 3 feet in diameter and no higher than 2 feet. Use only clean,

seasoned fire wood. Residents must be vigilant of the amount of smoke being generated so it does not create a nuisance.

The Fairfield Fire Department receives numerous complaints about excessive smoke or extraordinarily large fires that create a nuisance for those living nearby. If found to be creating such a nuisance, the Fairfield Fire Department will request that the homeowner extinguish the fire, otherwise appropriate actions will be initiated.



# Brush & Limb Pick Up

The Public Works Department will provide a *Call-in Brush and Limb Pickup Program* to residents now through October 19, 2016. Residents wishing to have utilize this service can make arrangements by calling the Public Works Department at 867-4200 or by email at [public\\_works@fairfield-city.org](mailto:public_works@fairfield-city.org) at least one week in advance of the scheduled pickup areas. Normal business hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 pm.

The three pickup areas will be the same as those used for the City's leaf pickup program; however, pickups will be scheduled (starting the first Monday of each month) as follows:

- The first week of each month – areas west of Pleasant Avenue (U.S. 127)
- The second week of each month – areas between Pleasant Avenue and Winton Road
- The third week of each month – areas east of Winton Road

No pickups will be scheduled the last week of each month to allow for machinery repair and scheduling for the following month.

The following requirements have been established to ensure the safety and efficiency of this program. There will be no deviation from these requirements:

- Limbs must be at least six (6') feet in length and no more than six (6") inches in diameter and should be placed in the same direction. Any limbs larger than 6" diameter will not be picked up. (Leave limbs as long as possible.)
- Smaller branches will be considered brush and must be tied and bundled with natural fiber cord that is biodegradable (cotton, linen or twine). Bundles tied with wire, plastic or nylon cord will not be picked up. All materials will be run through a chipper, so please ensure that there are no foreign objects (metal, building materials, rocks, etc.) as they could damage equipment or cause injury to equipment operators.

- Each bundle must not be heavier than 60 pounds and must be placed between the curb and sidewalk or at the edge of the roadway, not in the curb line or on the pavement. Placement of debris in the street is a traffic and safety hazard and is a violation of City Ordinance and will not be picked up by City personnel. Do not park in front of piles. Piles that are obstructed by vehicles or other will not be picked up.
- To schedule a pickup call, go online or send an email at least one week prior to the scheduled pick-up week. All calls and emails must report name, address and a telephone number. Please contact as far in advance as possible as it may be necessary to limit number of scheduled pickups in a specific week.
- The program is limited to one pickup per household during each area pickup week.

**Operation Dump Truck** can be utilized for larger limbs in addition to brush. This program provides residents a dumpster box or dump truck to be loaded by the property owner and disposed of by the City. For more information, please call 867-4200.

If you have small quantities place them out with your regular trash to be picked up by Rumpke at no charge.

Additionally, the Parks Department allows residents to drop off brush for chipping. More information call Parks at 867-5348.
