REGULAR MEETING OF COUNCIL
APRIL 23, 2012

[Call to Order](#)

Mayor D'Epifanio called the Regular Meeting of Council to order at 7:00 PM at the Fairfield Municipal Building, 5350 Pleasant Avenue.

[Prayer/Pledge of Allegiance](#)

Councilmember Holtegel led in prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

[Roll Call](#)

Clerk Jolivette called the roll of Council. Councilmember Holtegel, Councilmember Pennington, Councilmember Senger, Councilmember Abbott, Councilmember Oler, Councilmember Meyers, and Councilmember Jones.

[Agenda Modifications](#)

No modifications were made to the Agenda.

[Executive Session Requests](#)

Councilmember Holtegel, seconded by Councilmember Abbott moved to approve an executive session to discuss pending and imminent litigation and employment of personnel. Clerk Jolivette took a roll call vote of Council. Motion Carried 7-0.

- Proclamation - National Association of Letter Carriers

Councilmember Pennington presented a proclamation to Don Hershner declaring National Association of Letter Carriers Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive Day on Saturday, May 12, 2012. Mr. Hershner encouraged residents to place their non-perishable food items at their mailboxes. He stated food collected in Butler County stays in Butler County.

Vice Mayor Senger presented a proclamation to Environmental Commission member Greg Lubuono in recognition of Arbor Day on April 27, 2012. Mr. Lubuono thanked the employees of the Parks and Recreation Department for taking care of the trees on the public property in the City of Fairfield. He stated it increases the value of living in Fairfield and makes the City more beautiful.

- [Proclamation - George Wilson, former University of Cincinnati NCAA Championship Basketball Player](#)

Mayor D'Epifanio presented a proclamation and a *Key to the City* to George Wilson in recognition of the 50th Anniversary of his NCAA Championship win and all that he has done for the City of Fairfield. Mr. Wilson presented to the City of Fairfield signed pictures from Mr. Wilson's Championship wins and from his Olympic team win.

- [Proclamation & Presentation - "Parents Who Host Lost the Most"](#)

Councilmember Oler presented a proclamation in recognition of "Parents Who Host Lose the Most" Day to the students involved in the Fairfield Coalition for a Safe and Drug Free Fairfield. Jen Campbell from the Coalition stated the Coalition received an award in

Washington, DC in February because of all the work done by community members and leaders regarding underage drinking. Mayor D'Epifanio explained normally presentations are five minutes, but this wonderful organization is being given fifteen minutes. He commented on the outstanding youth in the City of Fairfield and in the schools. A short video presented by the Coalition was shown that highlighted the Coalition's efforts to combat underage drinking. Jen Campbell stated the students will talk about the strategies they plan to implement this prom and graduation season. Fairfield High School Junior class president Adam Reece read examples of messages that the coalition is spreading regarding underage drinking. He commented on the various ways the City of Fairfield helps spread the message against underage drinking. Fairfield High School Junior Matt Coates, discussed how businesses and parents have helped keep the prom and graduation season safe. Fairfield High School Sophomore Dalton Campbell commented on the ways local churches are assisting with this effort. Fairfield High School Junior Michael Plunkett noted the many ways that parents are helping the coalition. Fairfield High School Senior Jacob Milne schools commented all of the schools play a part in spreading the message and discussed some of their efforts. Students brought in silhouettes that have underage messages and will be located in 16 different businesses throughout the City and Township. The silhouettes will be interchanged from adult to youth. Councilmember Oler introduced Pat VanOflen and Jen Campbell from the Coalition.

Fairfield resident Allen Ehritz, 5732 Auberger Drive, asked Council why they will not approve a Kroger gas station on the corner of Pleasant and Nilles. He discussed the two vacant buildings on that corner and others in the area. He further discussed the savings on gasoline at Kroger. He discussed the traffic problems at CVS and Speedway on Nilles and Route 4, which he stated was worse and the bank. Mr. Ehritz commented on the Planning Commission's duty to advise Council and defend their recommendation to Council. He further stated he has no relation to Kroger.

Mayor D'Epifanio explained this has not come to Council yet. He further explained it started in Design Review and was turned down unanimously then Planning Commission turned it down unanimously. Mayor D'Epifanio further explained they have been asked for changes. Law Director John Clemmons stated it has actively been discussed between Kroger and the Staff and presumably Council will see Kroger's final product soon. He further stated Council has not made a decision yet.

Mr. Ehritz thanked Council and the City Manager for their efforts.

Councilmember Senger discussed the MASC Tournament that was held the last two weekends. He commented the results were encouraging with an estimated \$4.7 million brought into the local economy, which drew more than 19,000 people for the two weekends combined. He further stated there were 517 teams represented from nine states and Canada. There were only seven teams less this year than last year.

Councilmember Pennington congratulated the Fairfield Child Center on Donald Drive, a non-profit preschool, on their award in recognition of their step-up quality star rating.

Councilmember Holtegel discussed efforts made to try to get the Blue Ash Airport flight clubs or others to come to Butler County. He also discussed the Warren County Airport.

Councilmember Jones discussed the street and light audit that was performed with Public Works, which discovered that the approximately 193 street lights should be removed from the Fairfield street light account which is a total monthly savings of \$1,266 and a lump sum reimbursement of approximately \$25,000.

Allen Parker, Pleasant Creek Court, discussed an incident on March 31st in which he fell at the intersection of Augusta and Resor. He explained the sidewalk has settled in front of the curb by the crosswalk switch. He discussed health problems that he incurred due to the fall and all he is asking for is the problem to be fixed. He commented that he talked to the sidewalk manager and it has been 25 days and has not yet been taken care of. Public Works Director Dave Butsch stated at least a temporary repair will be made by tomorrow until permanent repair can be made. Mr. Parker submitted the attached photo showing the area in question for Council's review.

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE

Councilmember Oler, seconded by Councilmember Abbott moved to read the following three (3) Ordinances by title only. Motion Carried 7-0.

[Ordinance to authorize the City Manager to enter into an agreement with Physio-Control, Inc. for the purchase of new cardiac monitor/defibrillation units for the Fire Department and declaring an emergency.](#)

Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended an agreement with Physio-Control for the purchase of new cardiac monitor/defibrillation units. He stated this is 90% funded through the Fire Act Grant with the City's portion being \$17,500. He further commented it will be purchased under the State of Ohio bid contract and will replace an item that is 11 years old. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Oler presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Oler pointed out that this is replacing an old unit and to ensure that the paramedics and fire department and citizens have the latest equipment, so he would like to suspend the rules for three readings. Councilmember Oler, seconded by Councilmember Abbott moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Oler, seconded by Councilmember Meyers moved to adopt. Motion Carried 7-0. ORDINANCE NO. 37-12 ADOPTED AS AN EMERGENCY 7-0.

[Ordinance to authorize the City Manager to enter into a contract with Horton Emergency Vehicles for the purchase of a medium duty modular ambulance and declaring an emergency.](#)

Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a contract with Horton Emergency Vehicles to purchase a medium duty modular ambulance to replace a 2004 unit with 100,000 plus miles. He stated this will be purchased under Ohio state bid contract. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Oler presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Oler, seconded by Councilmember Abbott moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Oler, seconded by Councilmember Meyers moved to adopt. Motion Carried 7-0. ORDINANCE NO. 38-12 ADOPTED AS AN EMERGENCY 7-0.

[Ordinance to adopt a new subsection 517.01 \(ggg\) and a new section 517.16 of Ordinance No. 166-84, the Codified Ordinances of Fairfield, Ohio relative to sweepstakes terminal devices.](#)

Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a new subsection for the Codified Ordinances relative to internet sweepstakes terminal devices with the intent to pre-empt any future requests for such sweepstakes terminals. Mr. Pizzano explained these devices are actually the equivalent of gambling activity, which is illegal. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Oler presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Police Sergeant Pete Lagemann discussed the set-up for two businesses that came through last summer wanting to open a gambling cafe. He explained at one business internet access was purchased and a card with a sweepstakes number was given with a code to access gambling games on the computer. Sergeant Lagemann further explained once the internet time was finished the points are taken back to the counter and the cash value won or lost is given. Sergeant Lagemann discussed the business was told that Fairfield considered this was gambling, so the business moved on to another city. He stated the second business was similar except that a phone card was bought for the internet access. He stated the basis of gambling is to give something of value by playing a game of chance you have the potential to get something back of value. Sgt. Lagemann stated the State is also looking at the same type of wording to say this is gambling. He further stated these businesses are not regulated. Police Chief Mike Dickey stated the risk reward factor for a person using this business is very low, no one is going to walk away with a significant amount of money. Sgt. Lagemann

explained the businesses admitted there will be a low return, but people get the enjoyment of playing games. Mr. Bob Kramer, 5690 Genevieve, commented he doesn't want Chuck E. Cheese to be outlawed since it sounds similar. Mr. Allen Parker, Pleasant Creek Run, stated he opposes gambling and a move in this direction. Ordinance approved for first reading only.

Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a contract with Environmental Demolition Group for the removal of asbestos and a universal waste removal project at the former General Motors plant boiler house. He stated this project will be reimbursed from a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) through the County. He stated the company chosen is the lowest and best bidder. He further explained the City will partner with First Highland who owns the former Fisher Body facility and their intent is to remove the building and create a new building pad. Mr. Pizzano stated this is a potential economic development opportunity. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Holtegel presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Holtegel, seconded by Councilmember Abbott moved to read the following Ordinance by title only. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Holtegel, seconded by Councilmember Pennington moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of this Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a contract with Middletown Ford to purchase a pickup truck for the Water Department to replace a 1988 vehicle with an excess of 120,000 miles. He stated this is under Ohio state bid contract. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Meyers presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Meyers, seconded by Councilmember Senger moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of this Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a contract with Coughlin Automotive to purchase two Chevrolet Malibu sedans for the Court system to replace a 2000 vehicle with 105,000 and 1999 vehicle with 144,000 miles. He stated this is under Ohio state bid contract. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Meyers presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Meyers, seconded by Councilmember Senger moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended a contract with Miami Valley International Trucks to purchase a single axle truck cab and chassis for the Street Department to be used as a snow vehicle. He stated State of Ohio Bid will be used here as well. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Meyers presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended Urethane Unlimited for foam insulation and metal flashing at Digester #2 at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. He explained failures of the exterior brick are being experienced at this facility and it is becoming a safety hazard. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Jones presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Jones, seconded by Councilmember Senger moved to read the following Ordinance by title only. Motion Carried 7-0. Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended an amendment to the City Service Delivery Chart to reflect re-organization in the Parks and Recreation Department. He stated this matter has been reviewed and recommended by the Parks and Recreation Board. He explained the purpose is to reflect the evolution of the Parks Department from running outdoor programs to a full purpose operation. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Abbott presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Senger moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Meyers moved to adopt. Motion Carried 7-0. ORDINANCE NO. 45-12 ADOPTED 7-0.

[Ordinance establishing salaries for certain exempt and salaried employees of the City of Fairfield, Ohio, to repeal Ordinance No. 105-10 and all amendments thereto and declaring an emergency.](#)

Background: City Manager Pizzano recommended this modification, which modifies the titles to reflect the re-organization and does not result in any additional increases in salary. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Abbott presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Pennington moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Oler moved to adopt. Councilmember Meyers asked if the changes in the organizational chart will in any way impact the budgetary items related to salaries and compensation and if it is a net zero impact. Parks and Recreation Director Jim Bell stated that is correct. City Manager Pizzano explained this is one of the benefits of the city's broad banded pay scale. Motion Carried 7-0. Background: City Manager Pizzano explained this is largely a correction of an inadvertent modification made last year in the Court Magistrate salary range and this Ordinance will reflect the correct range which is below what was set last year. **Legislative Action:** Councilmember Abbott presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Oler

moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Meyers moved to adopt. Motion Carried 7-0. ORDINANCE NO. 47-12 ADOPTED AS AN EMERGENCY 7-0.

Background: City Manager Pizzano explained the changes to this ordinance including new minimum wage requirements by Federal law, re-classification of a Clerk I title in the Public Works Department largely due to the reduction of Clerk staff, the re-classification of a mechanic to a Mechanic Foreman, and to expand one utility operator position to a Chief Operator position. Legislative Action: Councilmember Abbott presented the first reading of this Ordinance. Councilmember Abbott, seconded by Councilmember Meyers moved to suspend the rules requiring three (3) readings of the Ordinance. Motion Carried 7-0.
